What is Naloxone?

- Naloxone is a short-acting medication that reverses the life-threatening effects of an OD.
- Naloxone can be administered by trained, nonclinical individuals.
- Naloxone has 3 formulations:

- Each prevention provider, treatment provider, and RBH site must develop a policy and procedure that outlines compliance to the Bulletin.
- SAPC will provide a <u>sample</u> naloxone P&P that is modifiable by each agency.

Bulletin Requirement	Compliance
Naloxone available onsite	Site visit
Naloxone offered to clients	Admission protocol
Staff trained to administer naloxone	Review staff personnel documentation of training
Develop P&P to ensure compliance to bulletin	Site visit
