SAPC 23-10: Implementation of Fiscal Reporting Process

 - NCADD-ESG/PV: Stanford Tobacco/cannabis Pv Toolkit (6 weeks).
 - SFP: Expand LST youth led Pv initiatives. Restorative practices
 - Day One: mentorship/relationship (continued support). Youth advocates
 - LST Transitions (high School 6 weeks)
 - Social Model: Started LST w/transitions materials

 - SMRS: Boyle Heights HS Service Learning Program/research as part of a school requirement.
 - Avalon Carver: Winners Sankofa (self-identity, Leadership Development, Shared stories/storytelling)
 - PYS: Art components to LST. Timeline of LST is a problem.
 - LACOE: Modify for what's relevant to your group.
 - LST adjusted as a Local Innovative
 - Phoenix House: Operation Prevention (National Guard)
 - *What is the data that we're looking for?
 - Consider CHKS data? Modify the survey? Tailor the Evaluation.
 - SMRS: LST doesn't work in skid row. Alternatives to meet our goals?
 - IPS: Trying to connect w/young LGBTQ populations. Unhoused youth living program. Implemented Transitions.
 - Pacific Clinics: <u>Strengthening Families (youth & parents)</u>
 - Safety First

C.O.R.E Center services

The C.O.R.E Center is part of the Department of Public Health/ Substance Abuse Prevention and Control (SAPC). Our main goals is to provide education on alcohol and drug prevention services to community members.

Prevention

Information on alcohol and drug prevention, and community advocacy opportunities

Screenings

Assessment are conducted to identify treatment needs, and referrals are provided to no- cost treatment services for Medi-Cal clients.

Workshops

Topics include preventing teen substance use and vaping, understanding health risks of different drugs, substance use disorders, and recognizing signs of relapse.
